Letter from the Chief

It is my honor to present to you the Fairmont Police Department's 2016 Annual Report. To say that I am proud of our department and our community is an understatement and the pride that our officers have in the service they provide to our citizens will show through in the following pages of this report.

During 2016 our department experienced some changes in personnel. Our year started out under the direction of Chief Greg Brolsma who retired after serving our community for over 30 years including the last 15 as Chief of Police. Chief Brolsma retired on October 31, 2016. We thank him for his service to our community and look forward to working with the many partnerships he helped forge in our community with a focus on creating a positive community for all of our citizens. We also recognize the retirements of Officer Dave Runge after 20 years of service to



Fairmont and part-time Officer Roger Carlson who has been serving Fairmont since 1977. We thank all of them for their service and wish them the best in their future plans. During 2016 we also added Officer Lily Paine to our department and welcome her to Fairmont.

During 2016 our officers responded to 9413 calls for service in our community. This is down a modest 8.2% from 2015 with a total of 10,185 calls for service. We acknowledge that while the overall number of calls may have dropped slightly from the previous years, officer time dedicated to completing required follow up and documentation of incidents has continued to increase. Methamphetamines continue to be a concern in our community and a focus of enforcement efforts with our officers. In 2016 there were 46 people arrested for crimes categorized in reports to the BCA as "Dangerous Non-Narcotics" which is the category that includes methamphetamines. In 2015 there were 23 people arrested in the same category. In 2016 our department has continued to focus on improvements in technology with the addition of new in-squad computers and new in-squad video cameras. Our officers take pride in the fact that we have some of the best equipped squad cars in the profession.

We look forward to 2017 as we start the year with a focus on the quality of service we provide in our community. **FPD** not only stands for Fairmont Police Department, but **FPD** also stands for what our officers' value in the way we provide service in our community: Fair, Professional, and **D**edicated. We greatly appreciate the respect and support of the community and we will continue to work hard to keep it.



2016 New Officers



Officer Lily Paine April 6, 2016 to Present

We are very pleased that as a result of the Upper Midwest Community Policing Institute Staff Study conducted in 2015 and with the support of our City Council and City Administrator that we were able to add one additional full-time officer position to our department. In 2015 we were staffed at 15 full-time officers after having been at a staffing high of 19 full-time officers in 2001. The additional full-time position puts our agency staffed at 16 full-time officers. Our agency enters 2017 in a hiring process to select two new officers to fill the full-time officer positions created by the retirements of Chief Brolsma and Officer Runge.

In the beginning of 2016 our agency conducted an extensive hiring process and we are very pleased to have selected Officer Lily Paine to join the Fairmont Police Department. Officer Paine grew up in Savage, MN and graduated from Burnsville High School. She attended Minnesota State University in Mankato and graduated with a BS Degree in Law Enforcement. Officer Paine began her law enforcement career in 2015 with the City of Madelia, MN Police Department. Officer Paine began her duties for our community on April 6, 2016. We welcome Officer Paine to our department and look forward to her being part of our Fairmont community.

2016 Records Department



In 2016 the Fairmont Police Records Division continues to be staffed by our two hard working Records Technicians, Renae Janssen and Tegan Quade. We are proud to have two employees who are very experienced in all that goes into maintaining our department records and the numerous other duties that they coordinate for our department and our community. Renae Janssen has been serving our community since January of 1989 and Tegan Quade has been serving since October of 2009. Our records division is responsible for numerous things including customer service at the Law Enforcement Center, reviewing and processing data requests, reporting crime stats, maintaining our records system, processing gun permits to purchase, responding to requests from attorneys, maintaining and organizing our evidence room, tracking property and evidence, maintaining record retention schedules, transcription of statements, and administrative support to the chief, lieutenant, and officers. We are very grateful for the high level of organized work they produce for our department and community.

In 2016, our Records Division continued to work with the new state E-Charging and E-Citation program that continues to work to improve efficiency of the state and county court systems. Our Records Division also continued to work towards electronic storage of certain case related documents to improve efficiency and information retrieval. In 2016 our Records Division continued to see the progress moving forward in the Evidence Room remodeling project in conjunction with the Martin County Sheriff's Office to better accommodate our current evidence storage and tracking. In 2017 we look forward to the completion of the remodeling project and continue to research the feasibility of implementing a new bar code scanning system for entering and tracking evidence as part of the current CIS records system.

2016 CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE INVESTIGATIONS





During 2016 the Fairmont Police Department worked together on multiple narcotics cases and arrested several individuals on felony narcotics charges. We have two officers dedicated to receiving up to date training and knowledge on current drug trends and the ever changing laws in the State of Minnesota. The position is referred to as Narcotic Resource Officers. (NROs) In 2016 our Narcotic Resource Officers are Officer James Tietje and Officer Michael Beletti.

The Narcotic Resource Officers along with several other officers from our agency were able to work numerous cases using informants, information from the public, and traffic stops to enforce the drug laws in our community. The Fairmont Police Department is updating its technology to assist in the apprehension of those individuals dealing controlled substances. Methamphetamines continue to be the focus of drug enforcement efforts in Fairmont in 2016. In 2016 there were a total of 46 individuals in Fairmont arrested for drugs categorized as Dangerous Non-narcotics which is the category that includes methamphetamines. This category is double the previous year of 2015 that ended with 23 individuals arrested in the same category and 27 individuals from five years ago in 2011. Marijuana charges ended at 17 for the year which is up slightly from 12 in 2015 but is down from 33 arrests five years ago in 2011.

In 2016 the Fairmont Police Department has worked with multiple departments over the past year to assist in arresting individuals trafficking controlled substance. In the past year our officers have worked with the Martin County Sheriff's Office, Truman Police Department, Sherburn-Welcome Police, Jackson County Sheriff's Office, Cottonwood County Sheriff's Office along with the Minnesota River Valley Drug Task Force. Many of our investigations extend beyond the City of Fairmont and Martin County so we are dedicated to sharing information with outside agencies to assist in the apprehension of drug dealers.

2016 Fairmont Police Department K-9 Unit



The Fairmont Police Department had one dual purpose K-9 in 2016 which was a German Shepherd from Slovakia named Jango. Sgt. Chad Sanow was the handler and the K-9 was trained and certified in narcotics and patrol. Sgt. Sanow had attended the 12 week St. Paul Police K-9 School with Jango from March of 2008 until May of 2008. Sgt. Sanow and Jango then attended a two week narcotics certification in Mower County with National K-9 Champion Jeff Ellis. Jango served our community with Sgt. Sanow from May 29, 2008 to May 25, 2016. After 17 years of being a dual purpose K-9 handler and with K-9 Jango's age, Sgt. Sanow decided to retire from being a K-9 handler on 05-25-2016. K-9 Jango is now enjoying retirement with the Sanow family at their home.

During the first five months of the 2016 year Sgt. Chad Sanow and K-9 Jango were able to assist other officers and agencies with several narcotic vehicle sniffs and searches. They were also able to search for suspect during a domestic at the Iowa State Line who was taken into custody. K-9 Jango assisted with searching several business buildings during commercial business alarms. K-9 Jango was also used to track, search for, and apprehend a suspect that had burglarized an occupied home and tried to get into two other homes on the north end of Fairmont.

The Fairmont Police Department will be looking to fill the current K-9 vacancy in our department in 2017 with addition of a new K-9 and the selection and training of a new K-9 officer. The Fairmont Police Department has a long history of excellence in the K-9 program including former National Champion Jerry Wolff and his K-9 partner Baron in 1980. We greatly appreciate the community support that has been shown for our K-9 program over the years and we look to continue to earn that support and respect with our next K-9 officer.

2016 Fairmont Police Department Website

During 2016 the Fairmont Police Department's website www.fairmontpolice.org continues to inform and educate the citizens not only of Fairmont and Martin County, but the world. The website is regularly updated with new and useful information so citizens can be informed of new crime alerts, people with warrants, sex offender notifications, officer biographies and helpful safety and security tips. We currently have 459 users signed up on our website to receive crime alerts and other important information via email.

A Google analytics program aids us in many ways including; tracking the number of visitors to each web page, where each visitor is from, how much time is spent on our website and many other useful tools. Included in this annual report is a page with graphics that show some of the following website facts.

- We had 12,916 visits to the website in 2016.
- Most visitors spent an average of a minute and a half on our website and visited two pages.
- About 57% of visitors used a desktop computer to view our website and the rest used mobile devices to view our website. (Phones, tablets etc).
- Most of the visits were from the U.S.A. (11,461) but we also had visitors several other countries.
- The most viewed webpage was the "Home" page followed by the "Most Wanted" page.

The "Most Wanted" page has assisted us immensely in apprehending people with outstanding warrants. We have had countless tips concerning the people pictured and listed on the "Most Wanted" page. These tips have assisted us in taking many of these criminals into custody. Many times the anonymous tipster has provided us with a new address of the subject, where they are working, or what they might be driving.

The "Contact Us" page has also been very valuable source of information for our police department. We have received numerous tips about unsolved crimes as well as concerns about speeding in a certain area, someone driving without a license, etc.

Overall, the Fairmont Police Department Website has proven to be very beneficial tool for the police department and resource for the community throughout the year. In 2017 we plan to migrate our website over to a newer more modern looking platform. This will make it easier for mobile users to view our website and will help us continue to serve the public well and promote our police department and community.



2016 Animal Control and Code Enforcement



In 2016 our community saw a slight increase in animal related calls from 709 from an average of 704 animal related calls in the years 2014 and 2015. In 2016 animals at large continue to be the main issue for animal related offences followed by barking / nuisance. Factors contributing to these numbers include: lost/found animals, animal/dog bites, barking dogs, animals at large, injured animals, and misc. nuisance animals (bats, squirrels, raccoon, and skunks). In 2016 there was a total of five animal related bites. Three of the animals were deemed potentially dangerous dogs and the other two dogs were never located. When a dog bite occurs the incident is investigated and if determined appropriate, the owner of the dog is issued a Potentially Dangerous Dog form that explains what precautions the owner must take and what future incidents could result in for the owner and animal such as citations or restrictions. In 2016 a total of 626 animals were surrendered to the Martin County Human Society.

In 2016 we observed a slight decrease in ordinance related calls from 265 which is down slightly from an average of 274 calls in 2014 and 2015. Solid waste and junk violations continue to be a primary focus of our ordinance enforcement efforts. Those numbers decreased slightly the past two years and we hope to see this trend to continue. There has been a push to inform the community on the solid waste and junk related issue through education and information with the City Newsletter, Fairmont Police Website, and the City of Fairmont Website that has the ordinances listed online. In 2017 we look to focus on continued proactive enforcement of animal and ordinance related offenses.

The Animal Control and Code Enforcement Officer in 2016 continues to be Officer Dustin Schwebke who has served our community in that position since 2007.

2016 Citizens On Patrol (C.O.P)



The Citizens On Patrol (COP) program completed its 11th year of service to the City of Fairmont in 2016. The program is currently comprised of seven members of local VFW Post 1222. COP members include; Harry Brumbaugh, Steve Langford, Dennis Madsen, Darrel Krahler, Gary Ruetzel, Art Elliott, Robert Meschke, and Francis Swanson. Harry Brumbaugh serves as the internal coordinator for the group and is the liaison to the Fairmont PD. Detective Eric Tonder and Officer Craig Fowler supervise the COP Program for the department.

Each COP member volunteers their time to assist the Fairmont PD function more efficiently by assisting with events that require a lot of manpower and freeing up Officer time for police matters. The COP members are provided with a light blue polo shirt and jacket, a flashlight, and OC spray. Each COP wears their VFW Post baseball cap in recognition of their honorable service to our country and their membership to the organization. The COPs are given training on OC usage and conflict resolution. Their civilian duties are to observe and report, not to engage in any conflict directly.

In 2016 the COPs continued their efforts assisting the department with numerous activities. Their presence can be seen at traffic and crowd control for parades, street dances, 4th of July fireworks display, Fairmont Triathlon, extended fire calls, severe accidents, and the Martin County Fair just to name a few. COPs organize two person checks throughout the year patrolling our local parks to provide a presence and having positive contacts with the pubic. COPs are also on the lookout for criminal activity like vandalism or exhibition driving in the parks and they contact an on duty officer to respond as needed. The COPs conduct house checks for those residents that ask the Fairmont PD to provide extra patrol of their home when leaving on vacation or for the winter months.

The COPs provide a valuable service to the Fairmont PD and the community. They donated hundreds of hours of their time, often during the holidays, and we are very thankful for their dedicated service to the department and the citizens of Fairmont. We hope that area residents will take the time to thank a COP for volunteering their time and for their service to our country.

2016 EMERGENCY RESPONSE UNIT (ERU)

Newly acquired in 2016 MRAP ERU Team Armored Vehicle

In 2016, the Fairmont Police Department continued its association with the regional High Risk Entry and Arrest Team (HEAT). The team is a joint powers coalition that consists of approx. 24 tactical officers, one trained negotiator, and two tactical dispatchers. The team provides service to the Minnesota cities of Fairmont, Truman, Sherburn, Welcome, Jackson, St. James, Windom, Mountain Lake, Lakefield, Slayton and Westbrook, along with the Minnesota counties of Martin, Murray, Jackson, Rock, Pipestone, Cottonwood, and Watonwan. The team also provides service to the Iowa cities of Armstrong, Estherville, Spirit Lake, Okoboji, Arnold's Park, Milford, Lake Park, and Spencer, along with the Iowa counties of Dickinson and Clay. The HEAT Team provides coverage to an area of approx. 4600 square miles with a population of approx. 110,000 people. In 2016 the HEAT Team was activated 10 times and responded to situations ranging from drug warrants to shots fired and barricaded subjects.

The team members are made up of employees of the coalition agencies and conduct monthly training sessions as part of their membership. In 2016 the team also conducted a multiday training at Camp Dodge, in Johnston, IA. The team conducts the multi-day training once a year to utilize the various military training facilities on base in a controlled and structured environment. All members of the team are required to carry their cell phones with them on and off duty which is the method that the team uses to page out members for a request for assistance.

In 2016 the team acquired a MRAP (Mine Resistant Ambush Protected) vehicle. This vehicle was acquired through the United States Government. This vehicle was highly sought after to replace the aging Peacekeeper Armored Vehicle that the team was currently utilizing.

The team uses armored vehicles to keep team members safe during situations where subjects may be armed and threating the lives of officers or civilians. We have used the armored vehicles multiple times to attempt communication with subjects in residences when it is not safe to approach on foot. The team continues to focus on the peaceful resolution of any incident of the safety of the victims, suspects, officers, team members, and all of the citizens of the communities they serve. Team members from the Fairmont Police Department are Chief Michael Hunter and Officer James Tietje. Chief Hunter is currently assigned as the team's Crisis Negotiator after serving as an entry team member since 1999. Officer Tietje is currently assigned as a Team Leader and is responsible for the planning and decision making during an ERU operation. We are also very proud to acknowledge that in April of 2016 Officer Tietje was awarded the Medal of Valor by the Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association for his actions taken to preserve the lives of others during an ERU incident in Westbrook, Minnesota in 2015.

2016 FSAP



Fairmont Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition

Fairmont Police Department has been a member of the FSAP-Fairmont Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition since the beginning when it was founded in 2011. FSAP was a five year grant provided through the Department of Human Services. FSAP is a group of friends, family, neighbors, and coworkers who work together to prevent underage use and abuse of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs in Fairmont. FSAP primarily works to share resources, ideas, and information to raise community awareness in order to promote prevention. In 2016 Chief Greg Brolsma, Sgt. Kevin Kelly, and Officer Shannon Bass continued to represent our department as part of FSAP.

The VISION of FSAP: To have a safe & healthy community where our youth live free of substance abuse and its harmful effects.

The Mission Statement of FSAP: Working together to eliminate alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use among Fairmont's youth by empowering & supporting them to make good choices.

Now that the five year FSAP grant has pasted the FSAP group has now expanded and moved on to a county wide grant which includes all schools and membership through all of Martin County.







2016 Police Civil Service Commission



The Fairmont Police Civil Service Commission is comprised of three community members who are responsible for providing civilian assistance and oversight to the Fairmont Police Department with regards to personnel related issues including initial hiring, promotions, and other civil service related activities. The Police Civil Service Commission adheres to the rules and regulations set for the in the Police Civil Service Commission policy book. Police Civil Service Commission members are appointed to a three year term at the approval of the City Council.

At the start of 2016 the Police Civil Service Commission was comprised of Commissioners Teresa Lenort, Mat Mahoney, and Dan Thiesse. On January 31, 2016 Teresa Lenort completed her term of service after serving on the commission since February of 2005. In 2016 Mat Mahoney stepped down from the commission after moving out of the city limits after having served on the commission since September of 2008. We would like to extend the thanks of our department and the community to both Teresa Lenort and Mat Mahoney for their dedication and service on the Police Civil Service Commission.

With the resignations of Teresa Lenort and Mat Mahoney we added two new members to the Police Civil Service Commission in 2016. John Korsmo was selected to fill the vacancy of Teresa Lenort and Daron Johnson was selected to complete the term vacated by Mat Mahoney. We welcome both of them to the Police Civil Service Commission and look forward to working with both of them along with current member Dan Thiesse to continue to insure the quality of police services provided to our community.

2016 Police Fleet Vehicles



The Fairmont Police Department has several vehicles in the fleet that are utilized by our agency. The current vehicle fleet is comprised primarily of All Wheel Drive (AWD) Ford Explorer Sport Utility Vehicles. Our current squad choice provides extra room as well as all-weather capability that is invaluable during our winter months. Our department has a mix of owned and leased vehicles depending on the assignment. The majority of our marked squad cars are leased through the State of Minnesota which allows for a savings of operational costs with all maintenance and repair costs being paid through the MN Department of Travel Management as part of our lease. The vehicle fleet is managed and supervised by Sgt. Chad Sanow.

A summary and description of our current fleet is listed below:

Four marked patrol vehicles which are used by all officers for routine patrol and taking calls. These vehicles are fully marked black and white Ford Explorer Police Interceptors they are all on three year leases with Fleet Services. Two of the vehicles are 2016s, one is a 2015 and one is a 2014.

One detective vehicle which is assigned to Det. Tonder. This vehicle is a 2006 Dodge Durango which is owned by the City of Fairmont.

One Animal Code Enforcement Vehicle which is assigned to Officer Schwebke. This vehicle is a fully marked black and white 2013 Ford F-150 truck which is owned by the City of Fairmont.

One K-9 vehicle. This vehicle is a fully marked black and white 2014 Ford Explorer Police Interceptor. This vehicle is on a six year lease with Fleet Services

One unmarked 2014 Ford Explorer Police Interceptor which is used for training, transports, and as a back-up squad for patrol functions.

One Mobile Command Trailer which can be used at crime scenes, mobilized for major incidents, mobile incident command and is used for public relations at the Martin County Fair every year. This trailer is owned by the City of Fairmont.

Each of the marked Ford Explorer Police Interceptors are pursuit rated vehicles. These vehicles are designed specifically for police duties and are supplied with the following equipment:

- Shotguns in every vehicle marked vehicle, Animal Control vehicle and the unmarked vehicle.
- Multi-Channel Radios which are used to communicate with other officers/agencies in the county and surrounding counties and statewide if needed.
- All marked and unmarked vehicles including patrol vehicles, Animal Control and Detective vehicles are equipped with emergency lighting and sirens.
- All marked squads, Animal Control and unmarked squad are equipped with Watchguard video cameras, radars for speed enforcement, emergency traffic cones for traffic direction, pursuit intervention road spike strips, emergency medical supplies, extra flashlights, AED for heart attack calls, shotguns, and Getac laptop computers with Gamber Johnson Docking Stations. All these computers and docking stations were purchased with a grant in the beginning of 2016.
- The K-9 Unit squad car is specially equipped with a K-9 cage in the back seat, rear area air conditioning and emergency functions which will role the rear windows down if the inside of the vehicle gets warm. There is also an emergency function which will allow the K-9 handler to open the rear door from a distance with a remote in case the K-9 is needed to assist the handler in an emergency.
- The Fairmont Police Department applied for and was awarded a grant for the purchase of laptop computers, docking stations and driver's license readers through the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Office of Traffic Safety. After obtaining several quotes, an order was placed with Insight Public Sector on January 21, 2016. The Getac laptop computers and Gamber-Johnson docking Stations arrived February 24th, 2016 and after BevComm IT placed all working programs on them they were installed in our squads in April and May 2016 or shortly their after. The total amount for all equipment combined was \$34,999.90. This amount was under the awarded grant amount of \$37,847.04 (State Reimbursement \$19,061.73 & Match Requirement \$18,785.31)
- Watchguard Squad Car cameras were implemented in our squad cars in 2016 replacing an older system that was very outdated. Officers from the Fairmont Police Department Uniform and Equipment Committee along with deputies from the Martin County Sheriff's Department began researching new squad car cameras back in 2015 in an attempt to integrate a system that both agencies could use and share some of the cost and expense. The committee and deputies were able to meet with other vendors and agencies with both agencies deciding to go with the Watchguard system. These cameras have been placed in all marked squad cars, Animal Control squad and the unmarked squad car (total of 7 cameras) with a cost of \$36,190.00 and a setup, software and evidence library cost of \$2,300.00 with a total cost of \$38,490.00. In the future we will be able to integrate the body worn video cameras with this system.

2016 Toward Zero Deaths (TZD)



In 2016, the Fairmont Police Department was the lead agency in cooperation with the Martin County Sheriff's Department and Truman Police Department for the State of Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths program. Participating agencies were awarded \$13,000 for overtime and benefits with an additional \$950 in matching funds for equipment for a total grant of \$13.950. We participated in several different efforts throughout the year focusing on the following enforcement areas: seat belts, speed, distracted driving and DWI. Through a coordinated effort of multiple agencies and local businesses, Fairmont High School hosted a mock crash to raise awareness on the dangers of unsafe driving that was presented to our students at Fairmont High School. The TZD program coordinator from the Fairmont Police Department was Officer Mike Beletti.

2016 In-Squad Computer Grant



In 2016 the Fairmont Police Department applied for and was granted \$19,000 in matching funds to update our in-squad computers. All fully marked patrol cars had new Getec military grade ruggedized laptops and docking stations installed at a cost of \$35,000. The grant was organized and submitted by Officer Mike Beletti.

2016 Taser Annual Report

The Fairmont Police Department has implemented the use of Tasers since 2004. Since that time, Tasers have been used multiple times to safely subdue combative subjects in non-lethal situations. All full time officers with the Fairmont Police Department are issued a Taser as standard equipment after going through the required user training. All officers receive yearly training on the Taser CEW (Conducted Electrical Weapon) conducted as part of their annual Use of Force training.

We are currently in the process of acquiring the new X-26P Tasers for our officers. The X-26Ps are being implemented because Taser Corp has stopped making the X-26s that many of our officers are now equipped with. The X-26 was phased out by Taser to update current technology and provide a better and safer tool for law enforcement. We currently have six officers outfitted with the new X-26P technology and have recently ordered four more at the end of 2016. Officer James Tietje is currently the Taser instructor for the Fairmont Police Department and is responsible for the required training of our officers and the maintenance and supply of our department's Tasers.

2016 Drug Court



In 2016 there was some restructuring in the Adult Drug Court of Faribault, Jackson, and Martin Counties commonly referred to as Drug Court. This also included Family Dependency Treatment Court that is also administered in the same manner as Drug Court. This included some personnel restructuring in the program and we are now sharing a coordinator who also provides service to the Nobles County area. In 2016 there was the addition of a random phone call testing service in addition to the random checks at the participants' residences. In 2016 there were 97 Drug Court checks completed by Fairmont Officers. This is down 79% from the previous number of 473 completed by officers in 2015 due to some restructuring within the program. There were 711 Drug Court checks completed by Fairmont Officers five years ago during 2011.

The Fairmont Police Department will be renewing our partnership with Drug Court in 2017. Our goal will be to continue to focus on supporting the administrative personnel and supporting the participants who are in Drug Court by doing our part of the program to help them succeed in the program and in their future. As we start 2017, Detective Eric Tonder has taken over responsibility from Lt. Ellis as our representative on the Drug Court team. We look forward to his success in this position and the continued partnership with the Fairmont Police Department and the continued success of the Drug Court program.

2016 Fairmont Crisis Intervention Team



Officers of the Fairmont Police Department trained as our Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) have effectively deescalated situations that in the past may have resulted in a physical confrontation. During 2016 Officer Shannon Bass was added to our team of certified CIT trained officers of Sgt. James Kotewa, Officer Bryan Bolties, and Officer Jaime Bleess. The addition of Officer Bass to our Crisis Intervention Team in 2016 brings our total CIT certified officers to four. This puts our department percentage of CIT trained officers at 25% which is well above the current state average for law enforcement agencies. The Fairmont CIT officers completed an intense 40 hour training hosted by the Crisis Intervention Team of Minnesota. In the recent past our department had participated in a training for officers in crisis intervention techniques sponsored by the Barb Schneider Foundation. Our officers also participated in a training that dealt specifically with crisis intervention techniques for Veterans. The Fairmont Police Department has seen the benefits of the team and anticipates additional officers will receive the 40 hour certification. The CIT officers are also used in situations where it may have not been a mental health crisis but when someone was under a large amount of stress such as ambulance calls and during death notifications. Fairmont Police are recognizing a growing percentage of the calls the police department deals with involving a persons in crisis. The CIT also did presentations to local public and private groups and organizations related to the services the CIT officers provide.

One successful example of CIT being used occurred in December 2016. A member of the CIT was dispatched to the Fairmont Mayo Health Center to assist with a person who was off his medication and in definite mental crisis. The patient was seeing things that were not there and was becoming violent with the staff. When the CIT trained officer arrived, he was made aware that the person in crisis was armed with a knife. Though the knife was still in his pocket, it still presented a threat to the officer and to the staff. The officer was successful in retrieving the knife from the man without any physical altercation. The officer was also successful in getting the male calmed and then medicated so he could be transferred to a facility for mental health for evaluation and treatment.

A person experiencing a mental health crisis presents some of the most intricate, dangerous, and unstable conditions that a police officer may encounter. Fairmont's Crisis Intervention Team officers have learned techniques to attempt to safely de-escalate and defuse these crisis situations with a focus on citizen and officer safety. The mission of the Crisis

Intervention Team is to help alleviate the problem with safety and compassionately handling a person in a mental health crisis. The training received is based upon the Memphis Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) model, which promotes the use of verbal de-escalation skills before using force when confronting a mental health crisis. CIT training has been proven to dramatically decrease the risk of injuries or death to both officers and consumers of mental health services, while also reducing the number of repeat calls. We understand and acknowledge the fact that dealing with a person in crisis in often unpredictable and there is no guarantee that crisis intervention techniques will be effective in every situation without the incident resulting in use of force for the safety of the citizens and the officer. Our goal is to give our officers and community another tool to work towards a peaceful resolution to an incident when dealing with a person in crisis.

2016 Alcohol Sales Education and Enforcement



The sale of alcohol is a legitimate business that plays a valid role in our community. The Fairmont Police Department prides itself on being a professional and pro-active law enforcement agency. Selling alcohol is a privilege that has very specific responsibilities attached to it. Our goal is to keep our community safe of alcohol related injuries and deaths. We work toward that goal through education to help keep our area businesses & servers protected from criminal and civil liability and through alcohol compliance checks of area businesses.

In 2016 the Fairmont Police Department, in partnership with the Fairmont Substance Abuse Prevention (FSAP) Coalition, offered "Responsible Beverage Server Training" (RBST) to all employees of businesses licensed to sell alcohol within Martin County. The training is conducted on an annual basis and upon request for seasonal employees or special event volunteers within Martin County. The training is provided free of charge to all attendees. Each attendee receives a certificate of completion after attending the 90 minute presentation.

The Fairmont Police Department conducts alcohol compliance checks of businesses licensed to sell alcohol within the City of Fairmont. These checks are done after annual training has been offered to business employees. Adult buyers under 21 years of age, and under the supervision of a Fairmont Police Officer, attempt to order or buy alcohol at a business. Buyers do not dress up to look older nor do they have any ID on their person during the checks. We want every business to require proper ID to verify that customers are 21 years of age or older and deny the sale of alcohol to the buyer or any person under 21. The purpose of the compliance checks is to enforce liquor sale laws within the City. Our goal with the annual checks is 100% compliance from all businesses by denying sales to all buyers and subsequently all persons under 21 that attempt to purchase alcohol. The compliance checks were not completed during the 2016 calendar year and will be conducted in the first half of 2017 after the Responsible Beverage Server Training has been offered and completed. Alcohol Compliance Checks are organized and conducted by Detective Eric Tonder.

Fairmont Police Department Training



In 2016 the Fairmont Police Department continued to provide an extensive array of professional training for the officers who serve the citizens of Fairmont. In 2016 our Department continued to utilize online training for our officers with our enrollment in PATROL, which stands for Police Accredited TRaining On Line. This program is developed and sponsored by the League of Minnesota Cities. The use of online technology for training is a huge savings in our Department's budget. Officers have the opportunity to complete monthly online trainings classes during their shift that save on the cost of overtime, travel, registration, and other costs associated with traditional onsite training classes. The cost of the online training averages out to be approximately \$5 per POST credit which is very cost effective for our Department. This also allows our officers to complete all yearly OSHA required training while on duty.

The training program is also responsible for the training and supervision of newly hired officers in our Field Training Program. In 2016 our FTO program provided structured training to our newly hired fulltime officer. In 2016 Officer Boltjes retired from being an FTO after almost 10 years. Chief Michael Hunter turned supervision of the FTO program over to Sgt. Chad Sanow after serving as a FTO for 10 years when he was promoted to Chief in December of 2016. We then added Officer Mike Beletti and Officer Craig Fowler to our team of Field Training Officers in 2016 with Sgt. Chad Sanow, and Officer James Tietje.

In 2016 all of our officers also completed our two yearly firearms qualifications and our yearly use of force training. The Minnesota POST Board requires that all officers complete a yearly Use of Force training as part of their requirement as a licensed peace officer. In 2016 the Use of Force training was conducted by Deputy Markus Murphy of the Martin County Sheriff's Department. In 2016 the department's training program was supervised by Sergeant Michael Hunter and is now supervised by Sergeant Chad Sanow.

2016 Workplace Violence Training

In 2016 our nation witnessed several active shooter incidents across our country including the Orlando Nightclub shooting on June 12, 2016 that resulted in the death of 49 people and wounded 53 others. Along with this and several other incidents in the news there was again a renewed interest in providing active shooter training in our local workplaces and schools. During 2016, Sgt. Michael Hunter and Officer James Tietje of the Fairmont Police Department partnered with Deputy Cory Ballard of the Martin County Sheriff's Office to provide active shooter/active incident training to some of our area businesses and local schools.

The training provided in 2016 was based upon the Department of Homeland Security program of "Run, Hide, Fight". The program teaches response options for people who find themselves in an incident of violence in the school or workplace setting. The focus of the training was to make a quick assessment of the incident to make the decision to try and lock the threat out, get out of the area, or take the threat out by active resistance to save yourself and others.

In 2016 we had the opportunity to provide the training to faculty and staff at Truman Public Schools, Martin County West Public Schools, St. James Lutheran School in Northrop, Building Blocks in Fairmont, as well as Human Services of Faribault and Martin County. In recent years we have provided the training in the Granada Huntley East Chain School District and assisted Strategos International who previously provided the training to Fairmont Area Schools. We also had the opportunity to provide an introduction to Workplace Violence response and policy related issues to some area businesses who are interested in the material as well.

General Statistical Information

The following pages contain general statistical information regarding the categories of calls for service handled by the Fairmont Police Department in 2016. The information also includes similar information for the years 2015 and 2011 for comparison. It should be noted that in 2011 our agency had two additional officers on staff. The information is also broken down to show the number of calls categorized by the day of the week. In 2016 and 2015, Friday accounted for the most calls for service while in 2015, Thursday accounted for the most calls for service. The leading categories in calls for service in 2016 are consistent with previous years and continue to be: Traffic Stops, Animal Complaints/Bites, Assist Ambulance, Escorts, Information Calls, Parking Offenses, and Ordinance Violations. Uniform Crime Report Information on the breakdown of Part I and Part II crimes are not available until later in the year.

Following the information on calls for service you will find Drug Arrest Information by Category for 2016, 2015 and for comparison the information from five years ago from 2011. The information shows the large increase in arrests for the category "Dangerous Non-Narcotics" which is the category that includes methamphetamines. There were 46 arrests in that category in 2016 compared to 23 in 2015 and 27 in 2011. Arrests for marijuana were up slightly to 17 from the previous year of 12. It should be noted that the 2011 statistics show 33 arrests for marijuana which includes 11 arrests for sales of marijuana that are added into the total number.
